Purpose. The 5-Year and Annual PHA Plans provide a ready source for interested parties to locate basic PHA policies, rules, and requirements concerning the PHA's operations, programs, and services, including changes to these policies, and informs HUD, families served by the PHA, and members of the public of the PHA's mission, goals and objectives for serving the needs of low- income, very low- income, and extremely low- income families.

Applicability. The Form HUD-50075-ST is to be completed annually by **STANDARD PHAs or TROUBLED PHAs.** PHAs that meet the definition of a High Performer PHA, Small PHA, HCV-Only PHA or Qualified PHA do not need to submit this form.

Definitions.

- (1) High-Performer PHA A PHA that owns or manages more than 550 combined public housing units and housing choice vouchers, and was designated as a high performer on both the most recent Public Housing Assessment System (PHAS) and Section Eight Management Assessment Program (SEMAP) assessments if administering both programs, or PHAS if only administering public housing.
- (2) Small PHA A PHA that is not designated as PHAS or SEMAP troubled, that owns or manages less than 250 public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550.
- (3) Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Only PHA A PHA that administers more than 550 HCVs, was not designated as troubled in its most recent SEMAP assessment and does not own or manage public housing.
- (4) Standard PHA A PHA that owns or manages 250 or more public housing units and any number of vouchers where the total combined units exceed 550, and that was designated as a standard performer in the most recent PHAS or SEMAP assessments.
- (5) Troubled PHA A PHA that achieves an overall PHAS or SEMAP score of less than 60 percent.
- (6) Qualified PHA A PHA with 550 or fewer public housing dwelling units and/or housing choice vouchers combined and is not PHAS or SEMAP troubled.

Skipping of a family on the waiting list specifically to reach another family with a lower or higher income is permitted to reach targeted thresholds.

The PHA will gather data and analyze, at lease annually, the tenant characteristics of its public housing stock, including information regarding tenant incomes, to assist in the PHA's de-concentration efforts. The PHA will use the tenant income information in an assessment of its public housing developments to determine the appropriate designation to be assigned to the development for the purpose of assisting the PHA in its de-concentration goals.

If the PHA's annual review of tenant incomes indicates that there has been a significant change in the tenant income characteristics of a particular development, the PHA will evaluate the changes to determine whether, based on the PHA methodology of choice, the development needs to be re-designated as a higher or lower income project or whether the PHA has met the de-concentration goals and the development needs no particular designation. Deconcentration and Income Mixing Goals. The CRHA strives through its various economic self-sufficiency and educational programs to achieve de-concentration of extremely poor families and any one site and income-mixing throughout its developments.

The PHA's income-mixing goal is a long-range goal which recognizes that the residents of its developments designated for the elderly maybe on fixed incomes which are not likely to be altered by HUD's income mixing goals. The PHA will use its annual analysis of its public housing stock and tenant incomes to provide benchmarks for the PHA. The PHA will target at least 40 percent of new admissions to public housing in each fiscal year to "extremely low- income families".

Apart from the elderly high-rise development, CRHA's incomes for all projects fall within similar ranges. Where there is significant disparity in the percentages of very low-income and other extremely low-income families at the various developments, the size of the units, the presence of larger, multiple-income families appear to account for the disparity.

The PHA will strive to achieve de-concentration of poverty and income-mixing through active pursuit of economic development opportunities for families which are designed to increase the total number of lower income families into higher income brackets.

The CRHA anticipates submitting a Mixed Finance Development application for the Sixth Street (AMP 3) development. We anticipate developing between 40-45 units on the site with a mixture of 1-3- bedroom units. The CRHA, the resident planners that live on the site and the Public Housing Association of Residents

- (PHAR) are currently planning the redevelopment. CRHA anticipates submitting the Mixed-Finance and Demolition/ Disposition application in mid-July, 2023.
- The CRHA plans to build upon partnerships with the RAB/RC and other stakeholders to continue the implementation of public housing redevelopment. In the current Fiscal Year, CRHA anticipates that these activities will include redevelopment planning, community engagement, environmental study/ survey, Demolition/ Disposition submittal and approval, site plan development and approval, permitting of construction activities, construction and related activities. To enhance its redevelopment prospects, CRHA will also consider pursuing acquisition of new properties for its portfolio if any such opportunities arise. - Consistent with the recommendation provided by CRHA, by the RAB/RC, in the current Fiscal Year, CRHA intends to explore the demolition and redevelopment of Westhaven (AMP1).
 - The CRHA is currently working with the Resident Planners and the Public Housing Association of Residents (PHAR) to redevelop the Sixth Street (AMP 3) Phase 1 and Phase 2 community located at 715 Sixth Street SE Charlottesville VA 22902. The property currently has twenty-five 3-bedroom style townhouse units. The property contains 4 dwelling unit buildings and 1 non-dwelling unit building that is used as a community center and management office. The CRHA HCV department is the current leaseholder of the Community Center on the Sixth Street property. CRHA received an allocation of Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) application in July 2022. We have submitted the Demolition and Disposition application for the Sixth Street Community (AMP 3) which consists of 1 apartment building and 6 units.
- The CRHA currently has an approved Demolition and Disposition application for the South First Street (AMP 3) Community located between 900-1000 South First Street Charlottesville, VA 22902. The current plan is to demolish the 58 public units located on the site. The current site has one 1- bedroom unit, seventeen 2- bedroom units, fourteen 3-bedroom units, eighteen 4-bedroom units and eight 5-bedroom units. Of the 58 units 3 are UFAS Mobility Units (1-1bedroom unit, 1-2bedroom unit and 1-4bedroom unit).

The CRHA currently operates a PBV program of its Voucher program budget authority to provide housing for the homeless. We plan to expand the families we assist through the PBV program for families in the South First Street Phase 2 (Development VA16000003) and Sixth Street Phase 1 (Development VA16000003). The CRHA will reduce or discontinue the issuance of new tenant-based vouchers so that the necessary PBV assistance is made available through attrition. The use of PBV's is consistent with CRHA's goal to explore, and where appropriate, convert Housing Choice Vouchers to Project Based Vouchers to support CRHA's redevelopment plans and objectives. The CRHA will also project base TPV's from replacement public housing units. In the current Fiscal Year, CRHA will work with the RAB/RC and other community stakeholders to continue determining the need for and designating for use certain project-based vouchers to assist in the redevelopment of CRHA's extremely- low income and very low-income housing portfolio. ☑ Conversion of Public Housing under the Voluntary or Mandatory Conversion programs. 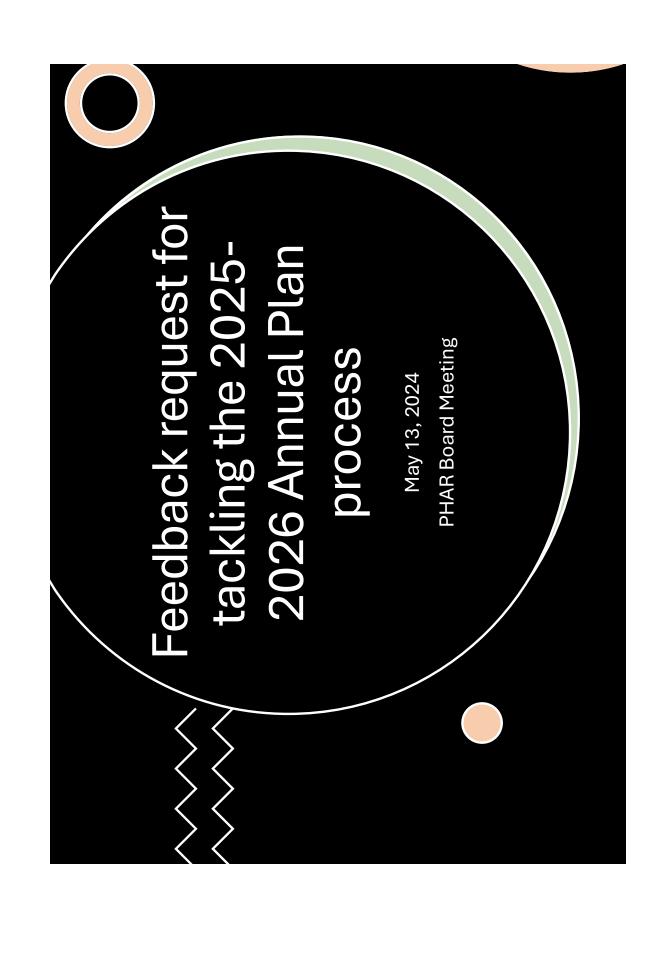

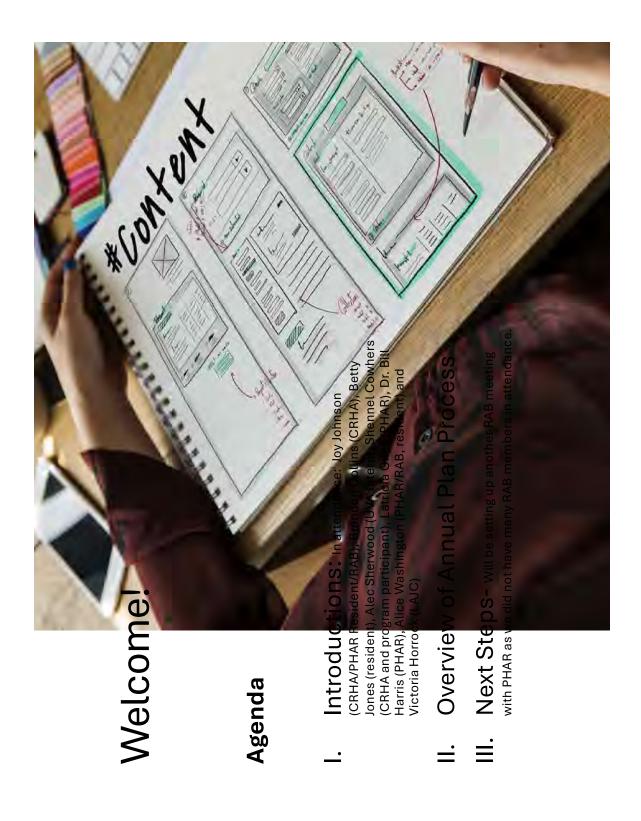

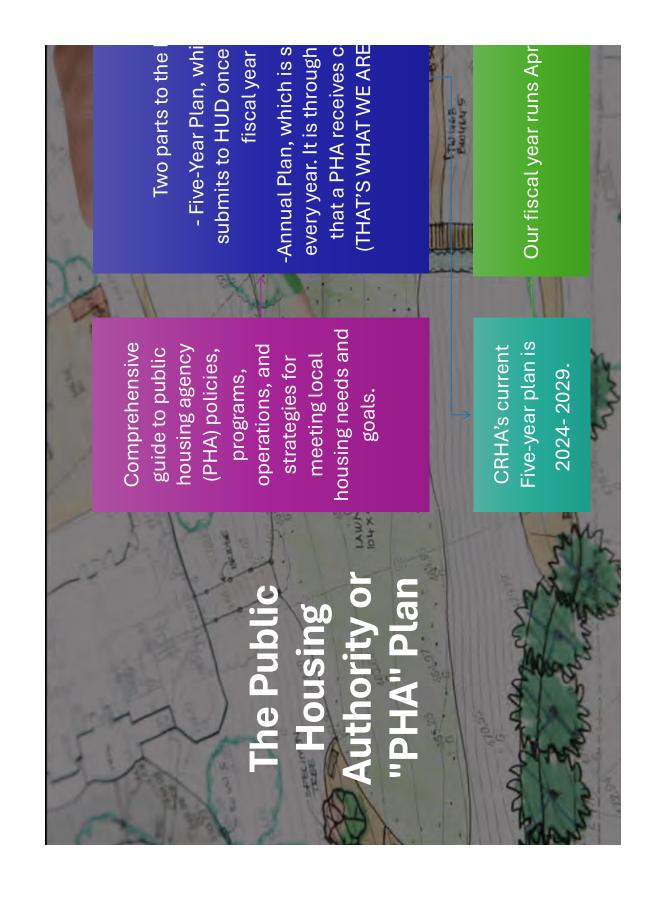

WHY ARE PHA PLANS IMPORTANT?

Your housing authority uses the PHA Plan to ask the government for money.

This money is called "capital fund" money. Capital funds pay for your development's major repairs and upgrades. Each year, your housing authority has to decide how it wants to spend this money. Resident input is very important because residents know what needs to be fixed and what needs fixing now!

HOW LONG DOES THE PROCESS TAKE?

The CRHA's Fiscal Year (FY) is April 1st- March 31st

- Annual Plan: Housing authority has to do every year. Generally, work for the annual plan starts around the end of the summer and wrap up with the submission to HUD around the end of the calendar year. beginning to end, the whole process takes about five months. Ask your housing authority, your Resident Council, or your Resident Advisory Board about when the process begins, how you can participate, and when the Plan is supposed to be finished.
- **5-Year Plan**: We will not be doing this again for a few years as we just finished the 2024- 2029.

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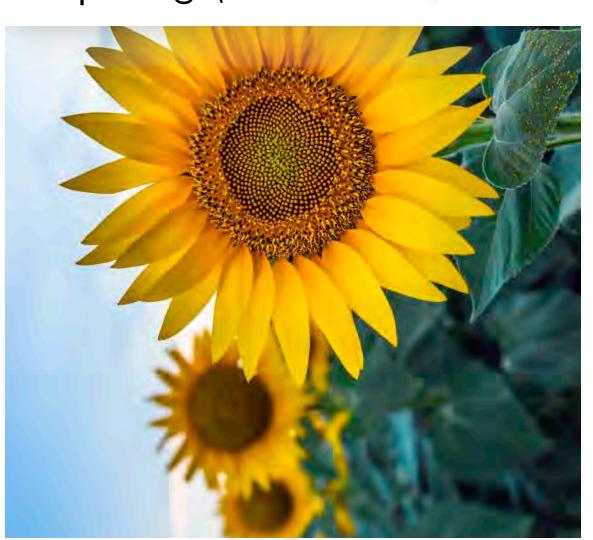

The Charlottesville Public Housing Association of Residents (PHAR) is the duly recognized Resident Advisory Board and jurisdiction wide Resident Council for the residents of Charlottesville's public housing. We are offering the following points of consideration on the proposed Combined Annual Plan for 2025-2026. PHAR is generally supportive and enthusiastic about CRHA's goals and activities particularly CRHA's willingness to work with PHAR to protect tenants' rights during redevelopment. General areas of consideration are outlined below.

1. Section A.1 Reduction in Overall Number of Families Served

The number of public housing units, number of voucher, and combined number of vouchers/units all reduced since the number reported in CRHA's 2024-2025 Annual Plan. Last year CRHA reported that it administered 681 Housing Choice Vouchers and 337 public housing units for a total of 1018 families served. This year, these numbers have been reduced to 641 Housing Choice Vouchers, 293 Public Housing Units, and 934 total units. PHAR would like to discuss why there is a reduction in the size of the housing authority and whether the reduction can be attributed to tenant based vouchers becoming project based as part of redevelopment. I

2. Section B.2: New Activities

This Section of CRHA's plan outlines the Authority's intention to engage in a variety of redevelopment activities. This including the following:

- Submitted Mixed Finance and Demolition/Disposition applications for Sixth Street.
- Submitting a Demolition/Disposition application for Westhaven.
- Demolishing 58 public housing units at South First street and replacing them with 58 units subsidized through Project Based Vouchers. CRHA will also use 55 of its tenant based housing vouchers to subsidize apartments in South First Street Phase 2.

These activities involve redeveloping public housing primarily using federally subsidized vouchers rather than replacing traditional public housing. PHAR acknowledges that the replacement of traditional public housing is very difficult but it is also critically important.

CRHA's Annual Goals include the preservation of Section 9 Public Housing and existing affordable housing generally in the City of Charlottesville. CRHA's goal states that it will apply for additional funding to preserve public housing that is not part of the redevelopment plan and that it is trying to acquire property to utilize Faircloth Units.

Public Housing Association of Residents (PHAR)

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PHAR is encouraged to see that CRHA is taking replacement of Faircloth unit seriously and that it is included in the housing authority's plans. PHAR hopes to work collaboratively with CRHA to achieve this goal. PHAR would like to meet regularly with CRHA to discuss the preservation of traditional public housing and would also like to see a detailed plan for how CRHA plans to retain these units.

Residents Bill of Rights

In 2008, PHAR worked together with CRHA to create a Residents' Bill of Rights for Redevelopment. The goal of the Residents' Bill of Rights was to improve the quality of life of all public housing residents while at the same time avoiding displacement. The history of public housing and the history of public housing redevelopment are sadly intertwined with the displacement of low income residents, particularly in communities of color.¹ In order to prevent the trauma of displacement, CRHA and PHAR created guiding principles for the redevelopment of Charlottesville's public housing communities. The Residents' Bill of Rights is attached as Exhibit A. Unfortunately, many of requirements stated in the Residents' Bill of Rights are not being followed. Particularly the guarantee of 1:1 replacement of public housing units. In particular, PHAR would like to work with CRHA to make sure that residents are continuing to be meaningfully involved in the redevelopment process.

The Residents' Bill of Rights also guaranteed public housing residents the right to return to their homes after redevelopment without additional rescreening or application processes. The right to return and limits on rescreening are a critical anti-displacement protections for public housing residents. Any barrier to returning to a community, increases the chances that current public housing residents will be displaced from their neighborhoods.

Importance of Preserving Public Housing

PHAR is pleased that CRHA is working together with residents to protect the rights of residents transitioning between public housing and projected based units. PHAR hopes to continue this collaboration as redevelopment continues. In addition to protecting the rights of residents moving to project based units, PHAR would like to see CRHA work to retain brick and mortar public housing units. Although federally subsidized housing vouchers provide similar deep affordability to residents similar to public housing, they present long term affordability risks because Congress can cut their funding with the stroke of a pen.

Reduced Number of Units at Sixth Street

"urban renewal." Charlottesville still bears the scars from the razing of the Vinegar Hill neighborhood. Other cities across Virginia and the rest of the country followed the same pattern. (See https://encyclopediavirginia.org/entries/urban-renewal-in-virginia/#:~:text=The%20Housing%20Law%20of%201937,Black%20communities%20across%20the%20country.). The systemic underinvestment in public housing at the federal level has created the need for public housing redevelopment projects. Unfortunately, these projects have also led to mass displacement of communities of color. For example, over 300 residents in Richmond's Blackwell neighborhood were displaced after redevelopment under the HOPE VI program. 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In Section B.2 of the plan, CRHA explains the plan for Sixth Street redevelopment. The number of units to be developed there are lower than last year 40-45 units rather than 50-80. PHAR is interested to know why there is a reduction in the planned number of units.

Section B.1: Updated Policies

This section of the plan notes changes to its policies required by HOTMA as well as changes to its policies but does not explain what such changes are. PHAR would like to see redlined versions of any policies CRHA plans to change so that it can fully understand the impact of such changes on residents and so that it can meaningfully comment. PHAR would further like CRHA to provide information for residents on the impact HOTMA changes will have on their tenancies.

Eviction Policy

Although paused a number of years because of the COVID-19 pandemic, CRHA has begun eviction proceedings against large numbers of tenants. Recently, there were 42 of CRHA residents brought to court in Charlottesville for eviction cases. PHAR urges CRHA to reinstate portions of its former eviction policy which lowered the rate of non-payment of rent evictions and displacement of residents. The protections in the prior policy included:

- A. Guarantee that CRHA would not file eviction cases against tenants paying the minimum rent;
- B. Guarantee that CRHA would not file eviction cases against tenants who owed less than \$50;
- C. Right of tenants to enter into a repayment plan for any outstanding rental balance;
- D. Guarantee that CRHA will review the rent calculation and payment ledger for all tenants before filing an eviction case in court; and
- E. Right of tenants to request a meeting with the Executive Director before being evicted.

Conclusion

PHAR is grateful for CRHA's commitment to ensuring safe and habitable communities and its commitment to resident led redevelopment. PHAR realizes the challenges that Public Housing Authorities face in a time of national disinvestment. Even so, it is critical to protect as much brick and mortar public housing and as many tenant protections as possible. For that reason, PHAR wants to work with CRHA to preserve Faircloth units. CRHA and PHAR should continue to work together to keep our communities strong.

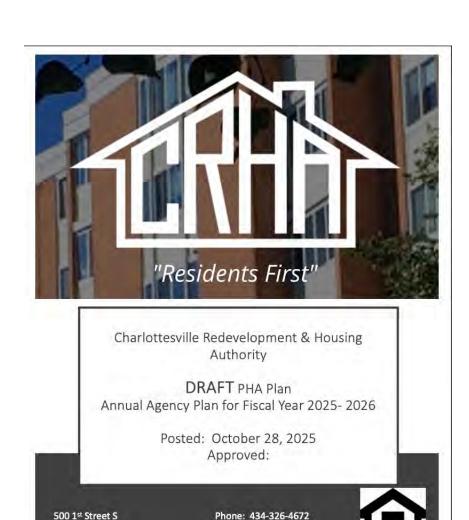

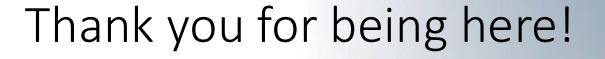

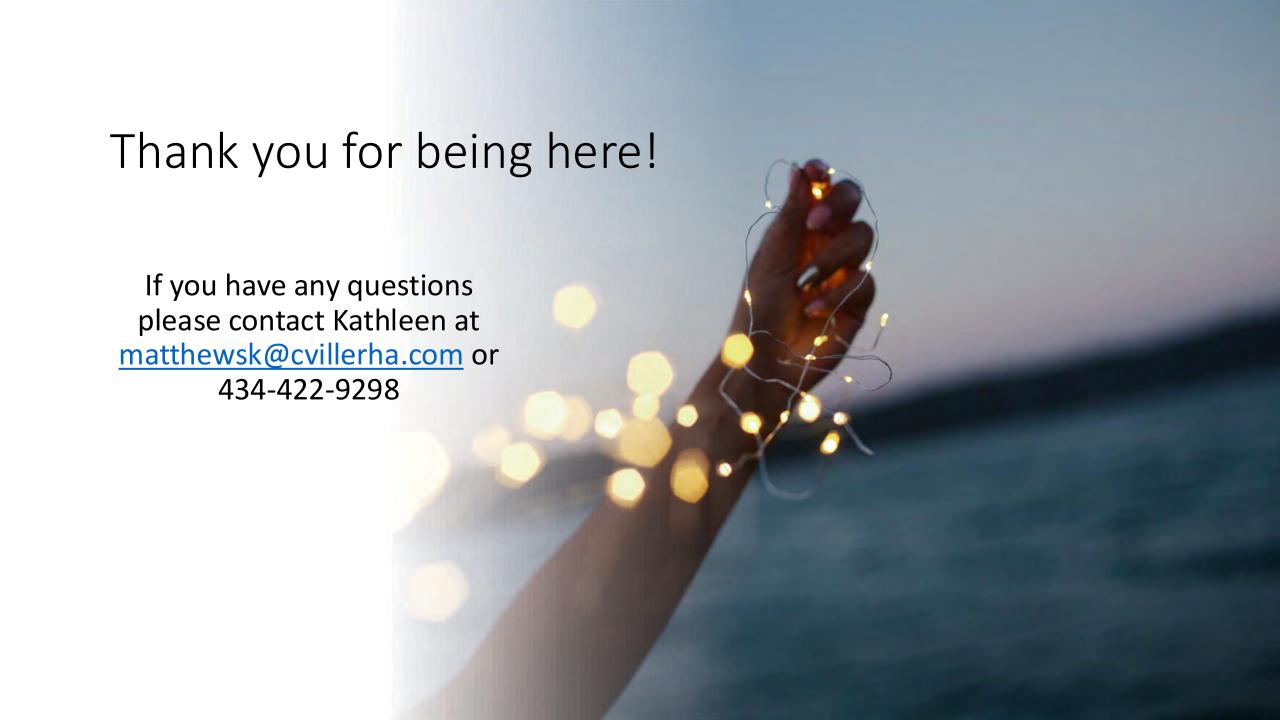

In addition, if it administers a Housing Choice Voucher Program, the PHA certifies that it will administer the program in conformity with the Fair Housing Act, title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act, and other applicable civil rights requirements, and that it will affirmatively further fair housing in the administration of the program.
- 7. The PHA will affirmatively further fair housing, which means that it will take meaningful actions to further the goals identified in the Assessment of Fair Housing (AFH) conducted in accordance with the requirements of 24 CFR § 5.150 through 5.180, that it will take no action that is materially inconsistent with its obligation to affirmatively further fair housing, and that it will address fair housing issues and contributing factors in its programs, in accordance with 24 CFR

§ 903.7(o)(3). The PHA will fulfill the requirements at 24 CFR § 903.7(o) and 24 CFR § 903.15(d). Until such time as the PHA is required to submit an AFH, the PHA will fulfill the requirements at 24 CFR § 903.7(o) promulgated prior to August 17, 2015, which means that it examines its programs or proposed programs; identifies any impediments to fair housing choice within those programs; addresses those impediments in a reasonable fashion in view of the resources available; works with local jurisdictions to implement any of the jurisdiction's initiatives to affirmatively further fair housing that require the PHA's involvement; and maintains records reflecting these analyses and actions.

- 8. For PHA Plans that include a policy for site-based waiting lists:
 - The PHA regularly submits required data to HUD's 50058 PIC/IMS Module in an accurate, complete and timely manner (as specified in PIH Notice 2011-65);
 - The system of site-based waiting lists provides for full disclosure to each applicant in the selection of the
 development in which to reside, including basic information about available sites; and an estimate of the
 period of time the applicant would likely have to wait to be admitted to units of different sizes and types at
 each site;
 - Adoption of a site-based waiting list would not violate any court order or settlement agreement or be inconsistent with a pending complaint brought by HUD;
 - The PHA shall take reasonable measures to assure that such a waiting list is consistent with affirmatively furthering fair housing; and
 - The PHA provides for review of its site-based waiting list policy to determine if it is consistent with civil rights laws and certifications, as specified in 24 CFR 903.7(o)(1).
- 9. The PHA will comply with the prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of age pursuant to the Age Discrimination Aet of 1975.
- 10. In accordance with 24 CFR § 5.105(a)(2), HUD's Equal Access Rule, the PHA will not make a determination of eligibility for housing based on sexual orientation, gender identify, or marital status and will make no inquiries concerning the gender identification or sexual orientation of an applicant for or occupant of HUD-assisted housing.
- 11. The PHA will comply with the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 and 24 CFR Part 41, Policies and Procedures for the Enforcement of Standards and Requirements for Accessibility by the Physically Handicapped.
- 12. The PHA will comply with the requirements of Section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, Employment Opportunities for Low-or Very-Low Income Persons, and with its implementing regulation at 24 CFR Part 135.
- 13. The PHA will comply with acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 and implementing regulations at 49 CFR Part 24 as applicable.
- 14. The PHA will take appropriate affirmative action to award contracts to minority and women's business enterprises under 24 CFR 5.105(a).
- 15. The PHA will provide the responsible entity or HUD any documentation that the responsible entity or HUD needs to carry out its review under the National Environmental Policy Act and other related authorities in accordance with 24 CFR Part 58 or Part 50, respectively.
- 16. With respect to public housing the PHA will comply with Davis-Bacon or HUD determined wage rate requirements under Section 12 of the United States Housing Act of 1937 and the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.
- 17. The PHA will keep records in accordance with 2 CFR 200.333 and facilitate an effective audit to determine compliance with program requirements.
- 18. The PHA will comply with the Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act, the Residential Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction Act of 1992, and 24 CFR Part 35.
- 19. The PHA will comply with the policies, guidelines, and requirements of 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Financial Assistance, including but not limited to submitting the assurances required under 24 CFR §§ 1.5, 3.115, 8.50, and 107.25 by submitting an SF-424, including the required assurances in SF-424B or D, as applicable.

- 20. The PHA will undertake only activities and programs covered by the Plan in a manner consistent with its Plan and will utilize covered grant funds only for activities that are approvable under the regulations and included in its Plan.
- 21. All attachments to the Plan have been and will continue to be available at all times and all locations that the PHA Plan is available for public inspection. All required supporting documents have been made available for public inspection along with the Plan and additional requirements at the primary business office of the PHA and at all other times and locations identified by the PHA in its PHA Plan and will continue to be made available at least at the primary business office of the PHA.
- 22. The PHA certifies that it is in compliance with applicable Federal statutory and regulatory requirements, including the Declaration of Trust(s).
